Once again, the season of Advent is upon us! As typically happens, it seems like summer has just ended when, all of a sudden, we look up at the calendar and realize that Christmas is fast approaching! The season of Advent is often filled with many and various activities as we plan to celebrate the birth of our Lord, the event that is second in importance only to His resurrection.

Sometimes we might hear someone say, "It seems like Christmas comes earlier every year!" (Maybe you've said it yourself!) And in some ways, it is true. Christmas decorations appear in stores as early as September. Christmas-themed movies are advertised as soon as Halloween passes. And a **statement** from my wife that she has already purchased my Christmas present reminds me of how hopelessly behind I am!

And on the one hand, we can't blame people for enjoying the Christmas festivities. In this time when the days are shorter, the colorful lights that decorate the inside and outside of houses are a welcome sight. Special treats like gingerbread and eggnog can remind us of a simpler, happier time. And who doesn't love spending time with friends and family, exchanging gifts and celebrating with special dinners? It's good to spread joy to one another.

But on the other hand, Christmas cannot actually come earlier every year. While our culture celebrates the "Christmas season" beginning anywhere from sometime after Halloween to just after Thanksgiving and then ending on the 25th, inside the church, the beginning of our Christmas season is the eve of the 24th. Until then, we are not in the "Christmas season." We're in the Advent season. And the Advent season is quite a bit different than the Christmas season.

The Christmas season is when we celebrate that "to us a Child is born, to us a Son is given; and the government shall be upon His shoulder, and His name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6). But in the Advent season, we are like those "who dwelt in a land of deep darkness" (Isaiah 9:2). We haven't reached the celebration. We're still awaiting the coming of our Savior.

Certainly, our Savior *has* come. He was born some two thousand years ago of the Virgin Mary and laid in a manger. So in that sense, the words of Isaiah, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone" (Isaiah 9:2), have been fulfilled. Jesus Christ is the Light of the world, the Light that no darkness can overcome.

And yet, there is a sense in which we are still living in a land of deep darkness, a sense in which we are still "Advent people." Though Jesus Christ has indeed come into the world, we have yet to witness the fulness of His glory. He has yet to come again in the glory of His Father's angels and set all things right. He has yet to bring forth the new heavens and the new earth, where we will no longer need the light of sun or moon, for He Himself with be our Light! Certainly we long for that Day. And certainly that Day will come.

But like Christmas Day, the great Day of the Lord does not come at the time of our choosing. Just as we cannot hasten the day of Christmas, we cannot hasten the Day of our Lord's return. Instead, we pray that *He* would hasten that Day! Until then, we wait.

And as we wait, we truly are *Advent people*. As we light yet one more candle on the Advent wreath each week, symbolizing the Light coming into the world, so also we know that the Light of Christ has come and indeed continues to come into the world. As we await His return, the Light of His Gospel continues to spread throughout the world, driving back the darkness of sin, and enlightening hearts and minds to the saving truth of God's Word. The fullness of the Light has not yet come; there is still much darkness in the world. But "The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5).

And so we see that, in a way, Advent is the season that most closely reflects our day-to-day lives. While we live in a world of darkness, the Light is present. While we cannot force the calendar to move faster or slower, we know that the Day will come. During this season as we anticipate that great celebration of Christ's birth, let us be *Advent people*. Let us look forward with hopeful anticipation as we continue to spread the Gospel to all the world. Amen.

Mission Lutheran Church and School Prayer Ministry

It's easy to get caught up in joy, busyness and excitement as we approach Christmas. Or perhaps we feel the panic, the stress and the loneliness that also can be part of this season. And yet--we know the best place for our focus this season: On our Lord Jesus and our salvation and taking time to nurture our relationship with Him with study and prayer. How do we pray? Anytime we wonder that, scripture is the answer! For whom shall we pray? Let's pray for ourselves, those we know and love and those who don't yet know the Lord! Here are a few scriptures that may help with Advent prayers:

In the first week of Advent, we focus on hope.

Isaiah 2:1-5: The word that Isaiah the son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. ² It shall come to pass in the latter days that the mountain of the house of the LORD shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be lifted up above the hills; and all the nations shall flow to it, and many peoples shall come, and say: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob. that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth the law, [a]and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. ⁴ He shall judge between the nations, and shall decide disputes for many peoples; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore.

> ⁵O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the LORD.

Romans 13:11-14: ¹¹ Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed. ¹² The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. ¹³ Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴ But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no

provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Matthew 24:36-44: ³⁶ "But concerning that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels of heaven, nor the Son, [a] but the Father only. ³⁷ For as were the days of Noah, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸ For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day when Noah entered the ark, ³⁹ and they were unaware until the flood came and swept them all away, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰ Then two men will be in the field; one will be taken and one left. 41 Two women will be grinding at the mill; one will be taken and one left. 42 Therefore, stay awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. 43 But know this, that if the master of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. 44 Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.

In the second week of Advent, we pray for peace:

Isaiah 11:1-10: There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.

² And the Spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord.

³ And his delight shall be in the fear of the Lord. He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide disputes by what his ears hear,

⁴ but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth;

and he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth,

and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked.

⁵ Righteousness shall be the belt of his waist, and faithfulness the belt of his loins.

⁶ The wolf shall dwell with the lamb,

and the leopard shall lie down with the young goat, and the calf and the lion and the fattened calf together;

and a little child shall lead them.

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and the leopard shall lie down with the young oat,

and the calf and the lion and the fattened calf together;

and a little child shall lead them.

⁷ The cow and the bear shall graze; their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox.

⁸ The nursing child shall play over the hole of the cobra,

and the weaned child shall put his hand on the adder's den.

⁹ They shall not hurt or destroy in all my holy mountain;

for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the LORD

as the waters cover the sea.

¹⁰ In that day the root of Jesse, who shall stand as a signal for the peoples—of him shall the nations inquire, and his resting place shall be glorious.

Romans 15:4-7: ⁴ For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope. ⁵ May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, ⁶ that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁷ Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.

In the third week, we pray for joy:

Isaiah 35:1-10: *The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad;*

the desert shall rejoice and blossom like the crocus; it shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and singing.

The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon.

They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God.

³ Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees.

⁴ Say to those who have an anxious heart,

"Be strong; fear not!

Behold, your God will come with vengeance, with the recompense of God.

He will come and save you."

⁵ Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped:

⁶ then shall the lame man leap like a deer, and the tongue of the mute sing for joy.

For waters break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert;

⁷ the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water;

in the haunt of jackals, where they lie down, the grass shall become reeds and rushes.

⁸ And a highway shall be there,

and it shall be called the Way of Holiness;

the unclean shall not pass over it.

It shall belong to those who walk on the way; even if they are fools, they shall not go astray. [a]

⁹No lion shall be there,

nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there,

but the redeemed shall walk there.

¹⁰ And the ransomed of the LORD shall return and come to Zion with singing;

everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain gladness and joy, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away. Psalm 51:1-12: Have mercy on me, [a] O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions.

² Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!

³ For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. ⁴ Against you, you only, have I sinned

and done what is evil in your sight, so that you may be justified in your words and blameless in your judgment.

⁵ Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me.

⁶ Behold, you delight in truth in the inward being, and you teach me wisdom in the secret heart.

⁷ Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

⁸Let me hear joy and gladness; let the bones that you have broken rejoice.

⁹ Hide your face from my sins, and blot out all my iniquities.

¹⁰ Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right^[b] spirit within me.

¹¹ Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me.

¹² Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit.

Hebrews 12:1-2: Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, ² looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

The fourth week, we pray for love:

Deuteronomy 7:6-9: ⁶ "For you are a people holy to the Lord your God. The Lord your God has chosen you to be a people for his treasured possession, out of all the peoples who are on the face of the earth. ⁷ It was not because you were more in number than any other people that the Lord set his love on you and chose you, for you were the fewest of all peoples, ⁸ but it is because the Lord loves you and is keeping the oath that he swore to your fathers, that the Lord has brought you out with a mighty hand and redeemed you from

the house of slavery, from the hand of Pharaoh king of Egypt. ⁹ Know therefore that the LORD your God is God, the faithful God who keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments, to a thousand generations,

Psalm 107:1-3: Oh give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!

² Let the redeemed of the LORD say so,
whom he has redeemed from trouble^[a]

³ and gathered in from the lands,
from the east and from the west,
from the north and from the south.

John 3:16-17: ¹⁶ "For God so loved the world, ^[a] that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. ¹⁷ For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

Stewardship

Anxiety vs. Trust

Jesus, in His Sermon on the Mount, teaches those who follow Him that worrying about the necessities of life is idolatry: worshipping a false god. Worry and anxiety show what we care about. Our anxiety reveals what we love and what we're devoted to. It reveals what we trust in.

This is why our Lord begins this section with an overarching principle: "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money" (Matt. 6:24).

But you say: "I must eat and drink. I must have clothing to wear and have a home in which to dwell." Yes, all these things you need. And Jesus says that your Father in heaven will ensure that you have them. He demonstrates this with a simple argument: your Father in heaven feeds the birds of the air, who neither sow, nor reap, nor gather into barns. He clothes the lilies of the field, who neither toil nor spin but are arrayed more luxuriously than Solomon in all his glory. If, then, your Father in heaven feeds the birds, if He clothes the lilies, how will He not also feed and clothe you, when you are worth more than they are? (Matt 6:25-33).

Do you know that you are worth more than them? You are worth infinitely more. You are worth the price of the eternal Son of God. Did the Son of God come down from heaven and become a lily? Did he descend and take on the form of a bird? No! He came down from heaven and became a man: flesh of our flesh and bone of our bone (Gen. 2:23). He is one of us, our brother. And what did He do when He became flesh to dwell among us? He gave His holy, precious blood, through His innocent suffering and death, that you might be His own and live under Him in His kingdom forever.

God became man in Christ Jesus. He lived the life we failed to live, and He died the death we deserved. He was raised again on the third day overcoming sin and death ... for us. He was crucified for our transgressions and raised for our justification. So, if your Father in heaven has given His Son to die for us in order that we might live with Him eternally, how will He not also give us all things to support this body and life?

To be anxious about the necessities of life, to devote yourself to food and clothing, to care about these things and find security in them, is to serve another god. It is to deny that you will live forever because Jesus, the Son of God, is risen from the dead and lives and reigns for all eternity. It is to believe that the God who created you, redeemed you by the death and resurrection of His Son and sanctified you by His Spirit, will not keep His promise to sustain you in this life.

Jesus says, "Seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness" (Matt. 6:33). God's kingdom is His rule among us. His rule among us comes when our Father in heaven gives us His Holy Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His Holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity. This is what we ask God to do for us in the prayer that Jesus taught us.

Your Father in heaven knows what you need - food and clothing, house and home - and He promises to give it to you. Chief of the things you need is His grace and mercy in His Son, Jesus Christ. So, seek after that. And those who seek will find. And all the necessities of life, our Lord says, will be added to you.
